

Mapping Argentina



Using an atlas or other resource, find and label the following on the map of Argentina.

- 1. Find and label Argentina's capital, Buenos Aires. Put a star next to it.
- 2. Find and label the city of Patagonia.
- 3. Find and label Tierra del Fuego.
- 4. Find and shade the area of the Andes Mountains in brown.
- 5. Mark the highest mountain in the Andes range, Cerro Aconcagua, with a triangle.
- 6. Label and trace the path of the Rio Parana in blue.
- 7. Find and label the Atlantic Ocean.
- 8. Shade the Pampas area (grasslands) of Argentina light green.
- 9. Find and label the Strait of Magellan.
